

"I stepped in a hole and tripped, Kenny," Grandpa answered slowly. "I think I broke my ankle. You will need to call for help."



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
## Winter Words

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## Four Seasons


Everyone knows there are four seasons. They are winter, spring, summer, and fall. But the seasons mean different things to people in different parts of the world.



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
## **Best Friends**

The two friends talked all afternoon. They wrote a long list. Then Beth chose one new thing to learn how to do.



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
# **Trading Places**
